Gospel Reflection

THE NEW COVENANT

Perhaps this year we could refer to this feast day as “The Blood and Body of Christ,” since the readings we have today use the word “blood” so frequently—eight times to one use of the word “body.” The New Testament authors, when referring to the sacrificial aspect of Jesus’ death on the cross, never refer to him giving his body as a sacrifice for our salvation, but only speak of the shedding of his blood. In both Testaments, it is blood that is the primary source and sign of the covenant between God and people. In our day, while we speak quite a bit about the Mass as a sacrifice, it is a bit of an anomaly that we focus so much (almost exclusively, sometimes) on the symbol of the bread become Body rather than the wine become Blood to give the life of the New Covenant. Here, as in almost every part of life, we would benefit more from living in a “both/and” and not an “either/or” mode.

has always preserved the duality of these symbols, since the sacrifice of Christ would not have been possible without both blood and body. So, too, is it for us who are sent from the eucharistic celebration. We are not merely “Christ-ed” bodies in the world; we need to be the very Blood of Christ coursing through the veins of daily life at home, in the workplace, at school—wherever the Spirit leads us and guides us. As we pray “Lord, send your Spirit on these gifts,” we must also pray that the same Spirit is sent upon us through the thanksgiving of our Eucharist, so we may become Body—and Blood—for the life of the world.

A BLOODLESS BODY?

We have been given a deep and rich pair of symbols to express the fullness of Jesus’ self-gift on the cross. In its celebration of the Eucharist, even when reception of Communion by all the faithful was infrequent and when the emphasis was on looking upon (called “ocular” communion) rather than receiving the elements, the Church

It was one of the worst episodes that I have had, but it has also been one of the quickest recoveries –probably because the pain forcibly confined me until Wednesday afternoon. I hope that my back is back.

TUE SATURDAY VIGIL MASSES

The 4:00 PM Saturday Mass seems to have a great deal of potential. One hundred fifty people were present for the “inaugural” celebration. It seems to have had some impact on the numbers attending the 5:30 PM –but not on their participation! The 5:30 PM crowd sang and prayerfully responded with gusto!

The 4:00 PM Mass lasted, according to the sacristy clock, 30 minutes exactly—but someone thought it was 32 minutes. For it to continue, we still need some adult servers and sacristans. It must also foster full, conscious and active participation and remain financially viable. We will evaluate it in six months, after Christmas.

FINANCIAL REPORTS

You will find in the bulletin this week the third-quarter financial reports (July 2008 –March 2009). Both Finance Councils deserve our deepest gratitude, and I commend Carl Draper (our business manager) for his daily administration. When I arrived at both parishes, there were significant financial difficulties. At OLMC, the staff had been decimated by position elimination. At STM, the parish was operating at a significant deficit (\$320,000.00/annually). While you can see that we still have a way to go, we have made significant progress in addressing those situations. Thus, on behalf of the parish, I thank all of you who have remained committed and generous supporters.

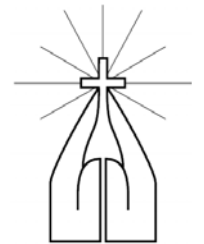

Weekly Message:

En Theos — Enthusiasm For The Faith

Why was the name for this Sunday changed from Corpus Christi to the feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ?

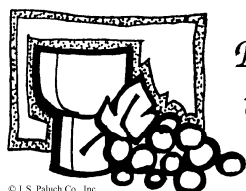
The Lectionary revised by Vatican II changed the name of this feast from Corpus Christi, the feast of the body of Christ, to the feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. Although several reasons prompted this change, the primary ones focus on the fullness of the sacramental reality.

Christ is fully present in the bread and wine which are transformed by the power of the Spirit into the body and blood of Christ. While the term "body" was seen as adequate, the fuller sacramental reality is better expressed by "body and blood." The emphasis on the "blood" of Christ was highlighted by the availability of the cup for all communicants, something previously restricted only to priests. This availability provided the opportunity to explore the rich meaning of Christ's blood for our faith lives.

Blood has always been linked to life and to union with others, especially blood relatives. Drinking from the cup symbolizes Christian willingness to share Christ's sacrifice. Sharing the cup represents our commitment to be united as one family. In Mark 10:38, Jesus asks his disciples, "Can you drink the cup that I drink?" By drinking from the cup, we respond yes to Jesus, committing ourselves to love and serve others. As you partake of the body and blood of Christ, reflect on the commitment you are making to be of service to God's people.

A Little Liturgy: by Chris Tolbert

The Sequence

Two weeks ago, on the feast of Pentecost, you probably noticed the addition of a piece of music after the second reading, before the Alleluia. This was the Sequence for Pentecost; *Veni Sancte Spiritus* (Come Holy Spirit).

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (aka *Corpus Christi*). There is another Sequence prescribed for today; *Lauda Sion Salvatorem* (Laud, O Zion).

Sequences date back to at least the 900's. The name comes from the sequence of notes (called a melisma) sung on a single word (very often "Alleluia") in early music. That sequence of notes would be applied to a new hymn text.



By the time of the Council of Trent (1543-1563) there were many Sequences for nearly every feast day. One of the reasons that Council was convened was reform, and in the Roman Missal of 1570, many of these Sequences were removed. Just four were left, *Victimae paschali laudes* for Easter, *Veni Sancte Spiritus* for Pentecost *Lauda Sion Salvatorem* for Corpus Christi *Dies Irae* for All Souls and in Masses for the Dead.

In the 1700's, *Stabat Mater* was added, and in 1970 *Dies Irae* was removed.

The original text for *Lauda Sion Salvatorem* was written by St. Thomas Aquinas around the year 1264. The text for the English version we are using today is translated from the Latin. The musical setting is by Randall DeBruyn.

The Senior Connection

Avoiding Falls

Too many of our seniors have fallen recently. Can falls be avoided? Did you know that hip fractures are the most common cause of hospital and nursing home admissions? Following are things that seniors can do to avoid falls:

- Carefully monitor medications! Are you taking too many (more than 4)? The more medications you use, the greater is your potential for falls. Are you taking them at the wrong time? Medications are the most dangerous when you first start taking them. Be sure to talk to your doctor or pharmacist before beginning any new medication.
- Stand up S L O W L Y after lying down or sitting—especially if you are taking any kind of heart medication.
- Make sure you are steady before walking; let the phone ring if necessary—you can always call that person back.
- Keep physically active. This will increase muscle strength and keep your joints more flexible. Find a way to add exercise to your daily routine. Ask your doctor or physical therapist about specific exercises to improve balance.
- Wear comfortable, good fitting shoes with a low heel. See a podiatrist about foot problems.
- Consider whether you should use a walking aid, such as a cane or walker especially if you have arthritis or Parkinson’s disease or have recently had a stroke.
- Plan ahead. Think about which friends and neighbors you can call on if you live alone and need help after a fall.
- Finally, plan to attend the Annual Senior Day at Bel-larmine on August 6th. Lynn Harrelson, one of the featured speakers, will talk about dangerous medication interactions and falls prevention. Rides will be provided to this event for seniors of both OLMC and

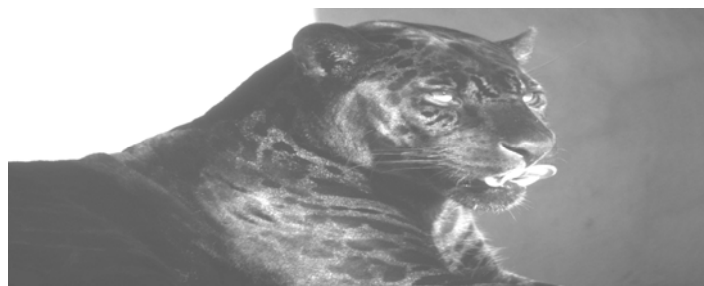

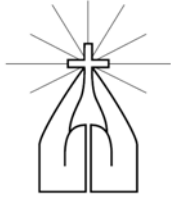
