Gospel Reflection

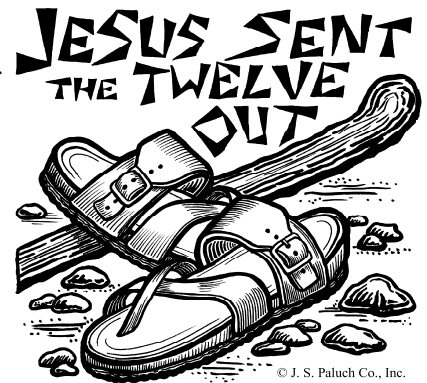
LOOKING AHEAD TO LISTEN TODAY

In next week's first reading the prophet Jeremiah will say, on behalf of God, "Woe to the shepherds who mislead and scatter the flock of my pasture" (Jeremiah 23:1). Today Amaziah, a priest of King Jeroboam, represents the archetype of this kind of shepherd. Against this sort of uncaring shepherd, God calls a real life-vocation shepherd and a true shepherd-prophet, Amos. The voice of Amos is one of the harshest in the prophetic literature, but the harshness seems to be necessary to counteract the misleading and scattering of the flock that the God of Israel was observing. Amos left his vocation as a shepherd of sheep and dresser of sycamore trees to become a shepherd of the flock of Israel and a re-dresser of the wrongs committed by those whose status as priest or prophet of Israel had led them astray from their own vocation. Another prophet, Jeremiah, would tell of the coming shepherd-king, anointed from the house of David, who will come to restore justice and righteousness throughout the land.

LOOKING BACK TO LOOK AHEAD

It is important to connect this week's Gospel with last week's. Jesus had just encountered a severe lack of faith in his family and neighbors, who took offense at him. So severe was their reaction to him that he couldn't work much in the way of healing or other mighty deeds. Yet immediately upon the heels of that incident, he summons the Twelve and sends them out ("apostle" means "one who is sent"). Jesus remains stalwart in the pursuit of the vocation he was given by God: to recover the lost sheep of the house of Israel. We have to admire the Twelve, who like Amos have left their own livelihoods as they

are sent out on a rather intimidating new mission. Our admiration ought to increase when we realize that this takes place immediately after the rather humiliating scene Jesus had just endured. But having witnessed Jesus face rejection and still persevere in his vocation, they must have been



made bold as he told them of the rejection they would face when he sent them out. Christ, through the Spirit and the waters of baptism, still sends us out on mission. This is our first calling. Let us, strengthened by the prophetic witness of Christ and the Twelve, be faithful to that calling.

A DAY IN THE LIFE OF...THE PASTOR

Several parishioners were surprised by my column two weeks ago, and although many people know that I am busy, they don't have any idea what "a day" looks like. Thus, over a couple of weeks, I am reflecting on my time in the parish.

AN EXAMPLE

Because of the column, I tracked what I did one day. I had daily Mass (8:15-8:45) and began checking emails, opening letters and working on the bulletin column (9:00 — 10:00). A school-related issue was brought to my attention, and it took the next hour and a half (10:00— 11:30). I was called to the hospital and spent some time with the family (11:30-12:30, w/ travel) before excusing myself so that I could visit a family at the funeral home (1 2:30 – 1:15 w/ travel). I returned to the parish and touched base with the Pastoral Associate (1:15 — 1:45) before I grabbed a quick lunch (1:45-2:15).

I met with the Business Manager (2:15-3:15), with whom I reviewed and signed checks for both parishes, examined the financial reports, evaluated a contract, discussed an on-going roofing issue, outlined plans for the coming weeks, and consulted about a personnel issue. I set a number of appointments so that the secretaries could contact them and finished the bulletin column before the deadline (3:15-4:00). I met with a couple (4:00-5:30) and had an administrative appointment (6:00 — 7:00). I then met with a parishioner (8:00-9:30), and stopped by a parishioner's home for an anointing (9:30-10:15). After the visit, I returned a pressing phone call (10:15-10:30) before grabbing "dinner" while I reviewed the week by phone with my priest-mentor (10:30-11:00).

As with your families and your jobs, what is planned is not always what happens! Each and every one of us could create a similar, very busy, very hectic day. My point is not to suggest that I am busier than you. My point is simply to help people understand what happens around the parish.

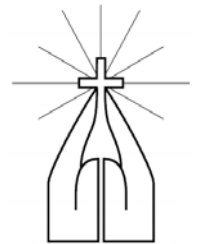

Notes of support, and cash donations to help pay for shipping costs would also be appreciated.

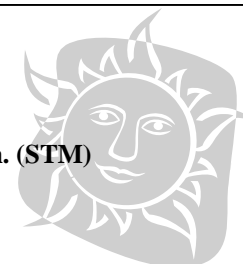

Weekly Message:

En Theos — Enthusiasm For The Faith

As we proclaim the Letter to the Ephesians on the next seven Sundays, how will the letter be helpful for our faith journey?

The Letter to the Ephesians has been traditionally attributed to St. Paul. Many Scripture scholars now conclude that a disciple of Paul composed this letter sometime towards the end of the first century. The letter situates Paul in prison writing a letter to the believers at Ephesus, one of the Jesus communities he had evangelized.



Unlike Paul's letters, which are rather specific in addressing particular communities and their special needs, Ephesians tends to be more general in tone and more universal in its directives. The Jesus community as the body of Christ is the dominant image in the letter. Similar to the images in 1 Corinthians, Ephesians stresses Christ as the head of the community with its members united in Christ and to each other. The gifts of each member are to be used to build up the community and create a sense of family unity and support.

This unity and communion within the body of Christ is all-inclusive, welcoming both Jew and Gentile, now uniquely bonded in Christ. Together the community is exhorted to battle all that would distract them from living like Christ, focusing on growing deeper in faith. Ephesians 5:1-2 captures the essence of discipleship: "So be imitators of God, as beloved children, and live in love, as Christ loved us and handed himself over for us."

Treasures From Our Tradition

At the time of the Reformation, although England broke away from papal authority under Henry VIII, a silent majority clung to the Catholic faith. Henry's eldest daughter, Mary, restored the "old religion" in a fierce persecution of Protestants (she is called "Bloody Mary" for good reason.) His youngest daughter, Elizabeth, rejected papal ties. Under her reign, beginning with legislation in 1593, Catholics were persecuted again, and only the very wealthy could afford the fines for not attending Anglican services on Sunday. They were called "recusants," from a Latin word meaning "refuse," since they refused to attend the liturgy of the Church of England. Many families maintained Catholic tradition in secret, and today their descendants claim "Recusancy" as a mark of family pride. For generations they sent their young people abroad to be educated in convents and monasteries. It is not surprising that the first monastery in colonial America springs from Holland with the daughters of patrician English recusant families. Port Tobacco, Maryland, proved fruitful soil for the Carmelite tradition.

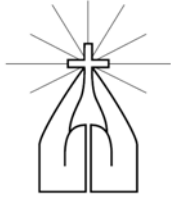
