Gospel Reflection

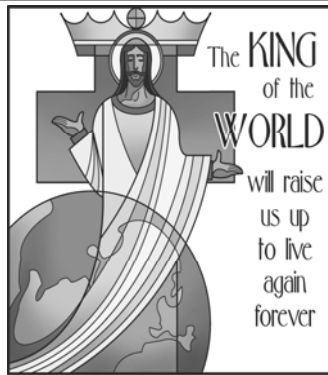
CHILDREN OF THE RESURRECTION

The possibility or certitude of life after the death of our earthly bodies has fascinated religions throughout the world and across the centuries. It certainly is the topic uppermost on the minds of the Sadducees today. They did not believe in a life after this life or a world where angels or other bodiless spirits dwelled. This constricted their ability, then, to imagine such a world or such a life, and made them imagine or construct it according to the life they knew as mortal creatures.

Indeed, such a tendency can be seen—even among Christians—today, when we speak of being rejoined or reunited with the faithful departed in a continued, if improved, version of the relationship we had with them. But God is a living God, Jesus points out, and those who believe in this God are made children of the resurrection to life everlasting. This is important, as today's Gospel dispute concludes Jesus' journey to Jerusalem to face his ultimate confrontation, culminating in his resurrection. His forthrightness foretells what the apostle Paul will write to the Thessalonians: "[T]he Lord is faithful; he will strengthen you and guard you from the evil one" (2 Thessalonians 3:3).

EQUAL IN DIGNITY TO THE ANGELS

Television, greeting cards, and some church ornamentation have done a disservice to the biblical notion of angels. Popular imagination perceives them as gentle, safe, and fluffy. Their job description is cast mostly in human, egocentric terms: to keep danger from us, to console us, to restore a sense of wonder or the miraculous to our narrow-mindedness. Some of this has its

basis in the biblical traditions. But, above all else, the biblical angels were direct messengers of God. Their voice was God's voice, their presence was the presence of the celestial throne of the Almighty. People were often startled or outright scared at their arrival, and had to be told not to fear; their messages were often difficult to hear, leading mortals into thorny situations. The children of the Resurrection—all of us, born of the living God—are equal in dignity to these angels. But in Christ we already have the power of resurrected life to be strong herald messengers of God.

This is the call of all Christian disciples. For this, Paul tells us, we are made strong in God who is not only a living God, but a faithful and loving God as well. Through God we will be given the endurance in Christ necessary to live out the vocation of our baptism.

**SAINT FRANCES XAVIER CABRINI (1850-1917)
November 13**

Burly longshoremen glared at the woman in widow’s dress who interrupted their drinking to beg money, in broken English, for her orphanage. The bar exploded in laughter as one man responded by spitting in her face. “That was for me,” the woman smiled. “Do you have anything for the children?” Given today’s national debate, could it be as much God’s sense of humor as God’s will for our sanctification that our first “American” saint should be an immigrant and naturalized citizen? Frances Cabrini, adopting the name “Xavier,” confided to Pope Leo XIII her longing to follow her Jesuit patron to Asia. But the Pope replied, “Not East—*West!*” So she and her Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart exchanged exotic dreams of China for the impoverished reality of Italian ghettos across the United States and Central and South America. Before her death, Frances had founded seventy educational, health care, child, and family service institutions. Today, from Siberia to Ethiopia, in sixteen countries, Mother Cabrini’s sisters and lay associates embody her practical spirituality: “Let’s get to work! We’ll have eternity to rest!”

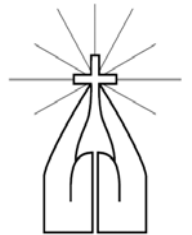




In our diocese, there is a collection that the bishop takes up for various charities. Why do we contribute to the diocese? Shouldn't our money stay in our parish?

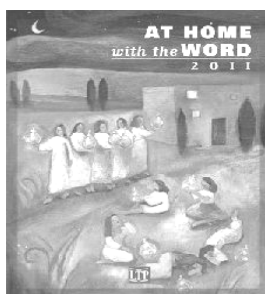
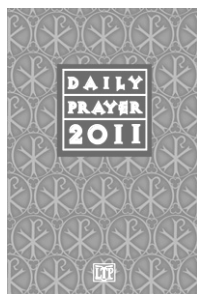
During one of my sessions with an RCIA group, we discussed social justice and got some materials about the Catholic Campaign for Human Development. A number of people, including some team members, were surprised to see how extensive our social ministry is and how developed our outreach. They did not realize that hospitals, social services, food kitchens, political lobbying, adoption services, farm co-ops, clothing programs, educational programs and school were all part of the ministry of the church. Although they heard the name "Catholic" associated with these places, it never dawned on them that this is one way the church carries out the mission to preach and live the Gospel! But good things do not come without cost. Sometimes people mistakenly think that the church can operate without paying anyone, or without running up some bills. Every pastor wishes that! Our financial support is what makes these worthwhile programs happen. A diocese is often in a better position to organize and administrate programs in a cost-effective way that affect large numbers of people. These things need and deserve our support as much as our parish.

Our time, talent, and treasure can do a lot of good if we are willing to give generously. We can and we do make a difference!

Tom's Meanderings

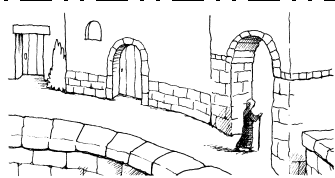
This is the month we remember all the Saints of Heaven and the saints and sinners we have known personally who have died. Let's look at the Saints in Upper Case for a minute, Our Confirmation Class – a great group of 40 8th graders – are researching a Saint whose name they will take at Confirmation. I love to read the reports they write. Sometimes they choose their Baptismal name, or maybe a name of someone they care about, or a Saint that they've heard of. And others may pick a name that sounds good, By the end of it though, they find a person who could teach them a lot about living life. One of the great gifts of the Church are these saints – what variety, what gifts, what obstacles, what accomplishments. There is something for everyone. Here are humans who faced lots of the things we face and made it big where it really counts. Who is your favorite Saint, who is your patron Saint, who is your Confirmation Saint? Think about that and maybe talk with someone about it. There are lots of great stories here.

Now about those saints (and sinners) we have known who have died. Many of us have lost friends and family in the last year. We can't judge who is a saint or sinner, and God is a merciful God so we leave all of them to Him. But let's talk stories here. All of these people continue to live in our lives one way or another. They all are bearers of the Good News to us. They have shown how they, in their own unique ways, have led hit and miss lives of following Jesus. Their hits and misses are like ours— sometimes we learn, sometimes we can see if it's a hit or miss, and sometime we are just puzzled.

Maybe this is a time we can think about how we will be remembered. Lots of it will be like the stories we hear about ourselves when friends and families get together and tease us. But there will be deeper things, incidents we don't remember at all that have made a great impression on someone. As all of this is sifted out, our prayer should be that the positive outweighs the negative.

The following information was received from the Alzheimer's Association regarding upcoming workshops for the caregiver.

Alzheimer's Education Series, sponsored by the **Alzheimer's Association** will be held on **Wednesday** evening from **6:30 PM to 7:30 PM** at the St. Matthews Free Public Library on November 10th and 17th. The series will cover the basics of dementia, safety techniques for persons with dementia, and hospice care. The program is **FREE**.

ABC's of Alzheimer's Caregiving will be held on November 8th from 9:00 AM to 11:00AM at the Alzheimer's Association office at Kaden Tower, 6100, Dutchman's Lane, Suite 401. This program is **FREE** and is designed to help new caregivers familiarize themselves with the basics of dementia, safety awareness, treatments, and activities.

The Best Friends Approach to Alzheimer's Caregiving is a practical life-enhancing model for anyone currently caring for a person with Alzheimer's. This program goes beyond the basics and teaches caregivers how to nurture and build friendships with the persons they are caring for. This program will be offered on November 10th at the Alzheimer's Association, 6100 Dutchman's Lane, Suite 401 beginning at 10:00 AM. **FREE** lunch.

The Family Caregiver Workshop is offered in cooperation with **KIPDA**. It is designed specifically to support family caregivers and is not open to professionals.
