Gospel Reflection

WHATEVER YOU DID FOR THESE LEAST ONES, YOU DID FOR ME

Our Gospel for this Sunday is Matthew's account of the Last Judgment, when Jesus says that the Son of Man will be present at the end of time to separate the sheep from the goats, those who cared for "the least ones" from those who did not. In this Gospel Jesus seems to identify himself with the king and judge as well as with the least ones who were in need.

In contrast, the first reading and the psalm depict God in the role of shepherd. Here it is God who is tending the injured, the strayed, the sick, and the lost. This is what Jesus did throughout his life and by his death. He cared for the hungry, the thirsty, the naked, the ill, and the stranger. He bought freedom for all. Jesus is asking no more and no less from us. The nations will be judged on one criterion only: whether we imitated the compassion of God that was revealed to us in Jesus, whether we recognized the suffering face of Jesus in the least ones and responded with love.

"THAT GOD MAY BE ALL IN ALL"

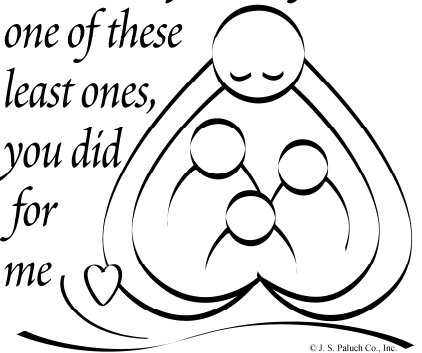
The reading from First Corinthians tells us the ultimate goal of all Christ's saving work—"that God may be all in all" (1 Corinthians 15:28). In other words, Christ does not wish to divide us, but to gather all people into the one flock and one kingdom of God. We are called to participate in that process of uniting all things in Christ. When

we care for the least ones we are gathering them into God's loving embrace and showing others the way to eternal life. When we neglect those in need we dishonor and scatter those who might otherwise have found rest, food, and healing in Christ's flock. What will it be? Will we follow the lead of our shepherd king?

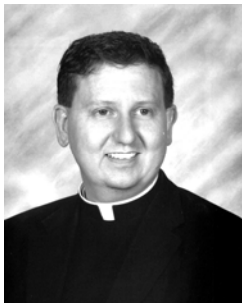

PILGRIMAGE NOTES

I had a wonderful time on pilgrimage. I was able to see ancient Corinth, Ephesus, Philippi and Thessalonica. I saw the place where Lydia was baptized (Acts 16: 14). I stood where Paul preached on the steps of the ancient synagogue in Beroea (Acts 17:10) and in front of the Areopagus in Athens (Acts 17:22). On the island of Patmos and on the Lord's Day, I stood in the cave where John received the revelation (Revelation 1: 9-11). I was also able to visit the House of the Virgin Mary outside of ancient Ephesus. It was a great trip!

MORE ON EXPECTATIONS

It isn't that "expectations" are all bad. In the proper context, expectations help us and others to meet our full potential. We expect our national leaders to defend human freedom and to maintain the peace. We expect our children to become responsible adults. We expect ourselves to work hard.

Last week, I reflected on the need for us to appropriately express our expectations of others. If you tell your teenage son to "be home at a decent hour," you might soon discover that your idea of a "decent hour" might be different from his idea. If your boss were to tell you to "be on time for work," you might find that more helpful than if he told you "I expect you to change your attitude."

Our expectations can be a reflection of how we wish to be treated. It reminds us of the golden rule, "do unto others Thus, we often have a proportionate responsibility. For example, if we expect our children to be respectful of others, then we must be respectful of others. If we expect our favorite team to "give 100%" then as fans we ought to be cheering and encouraging them. This might raise the question, "what do you expect of the Church?" and, more importantly, it might raise the question, "What can the Church expect of me?"



Weekly Message:

En Theos — Enthusiasm For The Faith

What is unique about Matthew's final judgment scene in chapter 25?

Matthew 25:31-46 depicts a final judgment scene in which all nations are gathered. Does this include Jews and Christians, or is the parable referring to non-believers who are neither Christian nor Jew? A good argument can be made that such is the case. If so, the parable addresses an issue that is still prevalent today—namely, how can non-believers be saved?

Matthew's Gospel delineates a conflict occurring between those who accept Jesus as Messiah and savior and those who don't. For Matthew, Jesus is Immanuel, God-with-us, who has promised that whenever two or three are gathered in his name, he is there in their midst. At the end of the Gospel, Jesus proclaims that he will be with his followers till the end of time; but the question does surface concerning the fate of those who are not believers or followers of Jesus.

Matthew recounts this final judgment scene to address that very question. The nations are judged based on how they treated the believers or followers of Jesus, the least of the brothers and sisters. If they took care of Jesus' followers' needs, then they are judged righteous and worthy of salvation. If they did not, then they are cursed. If this is the criteria for non-believers, how much more so should it be the criteria among believers themselves as well? Obviously believers and non-believers alike are subject to the same judgment.

Reflect on how you measure up against such criteria for final judgment.

Christ the King/The Gospel of Mark



Today is the Feast of Christ the King; the last Sunday of the Church year. Christ is referred to as King several times throughout scriptures: King Eternal (1 Timothy 1:17), King of Israel (John 1:49), King of the Jews (Mt. 27:11), King of kings (1 Tim 6:15;

Rev. 19:16), King of the Ages (Book of Revelation 15:3) and Ruler of the Kings of the Earth (Rev. 1:5). The feast day was introduced by Pope Pius XI, in his encyclical *Quas Primas* in 1925. In the encyclical the Pope notes that Jesus' Kingship is not obtained by violence:

"Christ has dominion over all creatures, a dominion not seized by violence nor usurped, but his by essence and by nature."

Next week, we begin Advent, and a new cycle of Gospel readings. Cycle B is mostly from the Gospel of Mark. Mark is the shortest of the Gospels (just 16 chapters). It is thought to be the oldest of the Gospels (written around 50 or 60 AD) and that much of it makes up the foundation for Matthew and Luke. Although written by Mark, it is thought by many to be the accounts of Peter.

Each week in the bulletin, the readings for the following Sunday are listed. I encourage you to read ahead in the Gospel of Mark as we proceed through this new year.

Start by thanking Him for the gift of eternal life and go from there. The Senior Connection

*The Scammers Are Gearing Up For The Holidays—
Don't Be A Victim!*

The Better Business Bureau is alerting consumers about the following scams—beware!

Post card Scheme. Local residents are receiving green cards in the mail that look like they are from the postal service asking them to call a toll-free number to claim a package that is being held for them. The card also says callers should have their credit card information ready. This is a deceptive marketing gimmick. Don't fall for it.

Star*72 Scam. A local resident received a call from a scam artist who claimed to be a State Trooper saying a family member had been in an accident. The resident was requested to dial *72 then call a phone number to ask about the accident. Star 72 is a call forward feature, which scam artists sometimes use to bill 1-900-calls to your telephone.

Charity Scams. Local residents report receiving calls from the "Trooper Association". The callers are asking for donations and bank account numbers. Don't ever give personal information over the phone to someone you don't know.

Prepaid Bank Cards. These are like gift cards but can be used almost anywhere a major credit card is accepted. When purchasing a prepaid bank card, consumers should pay extra attention to the terms and conditions, which can include substantial fees and limitations

Winterize Your Home. Heating costs are going up this winter. To save money, make sure your furnace filter and heating ducts are clean. Inspect caulking around windows and doors, inspect your chimney, and test fire alarm and carbon monoxide detectors. 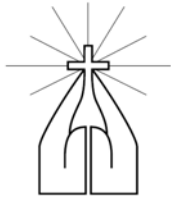
