Gospel Reflection

CALLING ALL SINNERS!

Today's scriptures show us two different types of sinners—both of whom Jesus calls to sit with him at table. First there are the self-reliant types. These sinners believe above all in their own abilities. The people from the time of Hosea thought they could bring an end to their afflictions simply by offering burnt sacrifices to God. The Pharisees of Jesus' time believed in their own efforts to keep them holy and righteous—efforts that would not allow them to eat with known sinners. Perhaps we know people like this. They think they are invincible. Anything bad that happens is someone else's fault. They look down on others and seem unable to realize that they themselves are sinners, too.

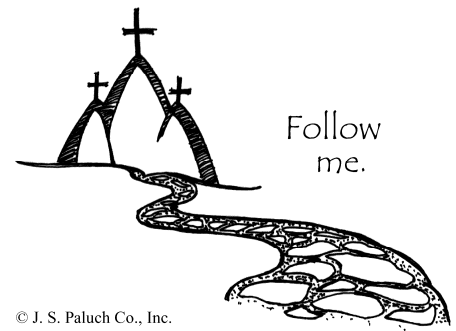
Then there are the "God-reliant" types. These sinners believe above all in God's abilities. They know their own talents as well as their limits. They take their share of responsibility for the troubles in our world and trust in God to lead them forward. We remember Abraham not because of his great abilities, but because of his reliance on God's power in the face of his own inabilities. Matthew is a model of discipleship, not because he was a saint, but because he recognized himself as a sinner, felt God's loving embrace, and "got up and followed" Jesus (Matt. 9:9).

FOLLOW ME

Which type of sinner are you: the self-reliant or God-reliant type? The type who knows or doesn't know your need for God? The type who resists or rejoices in God's love and mercy? The type who takes your share of responsibility for the "affliction" in the world and in your relationships? The type who shows mercy to other sinners and eats with them? Whichever type you are feeling most like today, Jesus' message to you is the same: Admit your weakness, put your faith in God, and "Follow me."

En Theos — Enthusiasm For The Faith

My mother always told me to pray to St. Anthony when I lost something? What's so special about him?

That St. Anthony is called upon for assistance in finding something lost is all that most people know about him. But Anthony of Padua, whose feast we celebrate on June 13, is regarded as the greatest preacher in the history of Christianity.



Born in Lisbon, Portugal in 1195, Anthony died relatively young in 1231. He felt called to do missionary work, converting the Moors to Christianity. Anthony joined the Franciscans to devote himself to missionary work and set off for Morocco. Ill health, however, forced him to land in Italy where he met Francis himself and lived a life of poverty and simplicity. He soon became one of Francis' favorite disciples and closest friends.

Asked to preach one day, Anthony enthralled his hearers with his great theological, biblical and oratorical gifts. Because of these special gifts, Anthony was appointed teacher of the Friars at the University of Bologna, and later sent to preach against the Albigensian heretics in southern France. Wherever he went, thousands came to listen and be inspired.

His concern for the poor brought about the tradition of St. Anthony's bread, which to this very day involves the sharing of food with those in need. Because of his learning, he was named a Doctor of the Church.

How do you continue to grow in knowledge of your faith? Ask Anthony for guidance and help in this matter, as well as when you have lost something.

Treasures From Our Tradition

In many parish churches, more rarely in monastery churches and cathedrals, the tabernacle with the Blessed Sacrament is visible from a doorway or aisle in the church. Normally, a person is to give the proper sign of reverence, a genuflection, when passing in proximity to the tabernacle. The word "genuflect" comes from Latin roots meaning bending (or flexing) the knee. A common-sense exception to the rule is for a sacristan who is taking care of the church and can't be genuflecting every thirty seconds during a vacuum run. Also excepted are persons in procession entrusted with important symbols of the Lord's presence. So, a crossbearer or a minister carrying the Gospel book, or ministers on their way to their Communion stations do not genuflect. For everyone else, the usual sign of reverence for the Lord's presence in the Blessed Sacrament is to genuflect on the right knee.

The oldest form of reverence during prayer in our tradition is standing; kneeling or genuflecting is a sign borrowed from old civic practice. The posture of kneeling, even on one knee, is a sign of submission. Servants would take this position before their masters in the ancient world. It said: I'm not running away, I'm yours, I'm here for you. This is what your genuflection says when you enter a Catholic church where the place of reservation of the Blessed Sacrament is visible to you: I'm yours.

The Senior Connection

Caregivers Helping Senior Drivers

Parents, grandparents and older relatives will tell you that driving plays an important role in maintaining an active lifestyle. Being able to drive means independence and freedom. As a family member or caregiver, we care about the older drivers in our lives—not only for their continued happiness—but for their safety as well. So how can we preserve our loved ones' personal freedom and mobility while ensuring that they're not a hazard to themselves and others on the road? Following are a few suggestions.

1. Understand each individual's strengths and weaknesses. Although experts agree that driving ability generally begins to deteriorate at age 55, not all older drivers are the same. Some people can continue to drive safely well into old age. Others can't.
2. Schedule regular physical check-ups and eye exams. Physical changes in hearing and vision often happen so gradually a driver may be unaware of a decline. Cataracts, glaucoma, and uncontrolled diabetes can impair our ability to see well enough to operate a car safely. Eye care professionals can also identify problems such as glare sensitivity, loss of peripheral vision, and poor night vision.
3. Suggest a driver refresher course. Older drivers often need to be brought up to date on changing traffic laws. Taking a refresher course can also refine skills and teach new behind-the-wheel techniques to compensate for the effects of aging. Depending on the state and the insurance provider, completing such courses may qualify the older driver for an insurance discount. Following are two sources of help.

AAA. Many AAA affiliated motor clubs offer an inexpensive, one-day driver improvement program for seniors. The phone number for the AAA KY Automobile Club in Louisville is 582-3311. To access their website go on line at www.Seniordrivers.org. This site offers a wealth of information for older drivers, caregivers, and others concerned with older-driver safety.
